As of the 2020 census, the population was 4,422.<sup>[1]</sup> making it one of least populous counties in Washington. The county seat and only incorporated town is Cathlamet.<sup>[2]</sup> The county was formed out of County in April 1854<sup>[3]</sup> and is named for Chief Wahkiakum ("Tall Timber") of the Chinook, who ok, who is buried in the Pioneer Cemetery in Cathlamet.<sup>[4]</sup>

The county operates the Wahkiakum County Ferry, which connects Cathlamet to Westport, Oregon, across the Columbia River

### Geography [edit]

rding to the Ur ed States Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 287 square miles (740 km<sup>2</sup>), of which 263 square miles (680 km<sup>2</sup>) is land and 24 square miles (62 km<sup>2</sup>) (8.3%) is water.<sup>[5]</sup> It is the smallest county of Washington by total area and the third-smallest by land a after San Juan County and Island County, which are mostly water by area.

The median income for a household in the county was \$40,372 and the median income for a family was \$47,266. As of the 2000 census, there were 3,824 people, 1,553 households, and 1,108 families living in the county. The population density was 14 people per square mile (5.4 people/km<sup>2</sup>). There were 1,792 housing units at an average density of 7 units per square mile (2.7 units/km<sup>2</sup>). The racial makeup of the county was 93.46% White, 0.26% Black or African American, 1.57% Native American, 0.47% Asian, 0.08% Pacific Islander, 1.65% from other races, and 2.51% from two or more races. 2.56% of the population were Hispanic or Latino of any race. 18.7% were of German, 13.1% Norwegian, 10.6% United States or American, 9.1% English, 7.7% Irish, 6.5% Swedish, and 5.9% Finnish ancestry 96.7% spoke English and 2.5% Spanish as a first language.

There were 1,553 households, out of which 26.90% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 61.40% were les living together, 6.30% had a female householder with no husband present, and 28.60% were nonfamilies, 24,40% of all households were made up of individuals, and 10,60% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.42 and the average family size was 2.83.

In the county, the population was spread out, with 23.40% under the age of 18, 5.30% from 18 to 24, 22.20% from 25 to 44, 30.60% from 45 to 64, and 18.50% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 44 years. For every 100 females there were 100.10 males. For every 100 females age 18 and over, there were 98.10 males.

The median income for a household in the county was \$39,444, and the median income for a family was \$47,604. Males had a median income of \$37,123 versus \$27,938 for females. The per capita income for the county was \$19,063. About 5.50% of families and 8.10% of the population were below the poverty line, including 11.00% of those under age 18 and 2.70% of those age 65 or over.
